


LEAF SHAPES 1



Lanceolate is the name given to a leaf which is narrow, tapers to a point at the apex, is broadest at the base, and assumes the shape of a lance.

(Wallflower)

Latin: lancea - lance




Obovate is the name given to a leaf shaped like an egg, with the wide part at the apex.

(Wood Sorrel)


Latin: ob - inversely






Latin: *ob* – inversely

(Convolvulus, Sagittaria)


Latin: sagitta - arrow



Ovate is the name given to a leaf shaped like the longitudinal section of an egg, with the wide part at the base.

(Lilac)

Latin: ovum - egg






name given to a leaf shaped like a heart, but with the point of the heart at the base of the leaf.

(White clover)


Latin: ob - inversely



Hastate is the name given to a triangular leaf with its basal angles or lobes spread out, resembling the shape of a halberd.

(Arum)

Latin: hasta - spear





atin: cor cordis - heart

Cordate is the name given to a leaf shaped like a heart.

(Deadnettle)
